Description/Purpose: The purpose of the course is to acquaint students with a wide range of literature on the South, bearing in mind that the South's population as well as national changes also impacted its regional development. It is imperative that students tend to reading assignments time and that all class members participate in discussions. Each week discussion leaders (chosen in advance) will give a brief overview and raise appropriate questions on a pre-chosen book; afterward each class member must respond to the subject of the week and the general reading material. In the last segment of class each member must respond to the week's topic and its connection with her/his chosen reading for the week. This part of the course counts for 50% of course grade. The historiographical essay that each student submits at semester's end counts for the other 50% of the course grade.

The bibliography for this course is arranged chronologically to fit the span of years that the course covers. Obviously, many of the citations on the list will fit far more than one session. But that should constitute little difficulty. Members of the class should be mindful that this is a selective list of books and articles on the subject. Please feel free to suggest alternative titles for any session, but do so in advance so that we may all be aware of the additions.
